Dear friends,

Growth and change have been our watchwords this year. What stayed the same was our steady focus on what is best for patients.

Growth. We opened a second dialysis clinic in Federal Way and one in Fife, our first in Pierce County. We enlarged our Kent clinic's treatment capacity by 50%. The state approved south Everett as the site of our 20th dialysis clinic; it will open in 2020. With your help, we grew our fundraising to \$3.3 million, a new record.

Change. Less tangible but noteworthy was our adoption of a new electronic medical record, replacing a system in use since 2005. Teams spent more than a year getting ready for the successful software launch, making us more efficient in serving patients.

Caring for patients. Our scores for quality of care continue to lead the nation. The average rating of our clinics is 4.6 on the federal government's 5-star scale.

And more change. Joyce Jackson announced retirement plans and the board launched a search for the next CEO. Our executive team is prepared to hold a steady course during the transition.

Northwest Kidney Centers staff members come to work every day so that people with kidney disease can enjoy optimal health, quality of life and independence. We extend our deepest thanks for your part in supporting that mission.

EXPANSION

Construction hummed along at our future clinic in Seattle's Rainier Beach neighborhood as well as at our new Burien campus. The campus includes a dialysis clinic relocated from West Seattle, a modern logistics center to process and distribute supplies and equipment, and a centralized office for support staff members formerly spread around the region. These sites will open in the new fiscal year.


Northwest Kidney Centers has had only three chief executives in its 57 years. Now the board of trustees is seeking the fourth. After 21 years at our helm, Joyce Jackson announced plans to retire in late 2019. Jackson unified Northwest Kidney Centers clinics and developed standardized procedures, built revenue from service delivery and fundraising, and launched research initiatives poised to advance kidney care in significant ways.






RESEARCH


We cheered this year at NASA's launch of the kidney-on-a-chip into space. Astronauts performed experiments accelerated by microgravity to learn about kidney function. Those experiments were devised at the Kidney Research Institute, our collaboration with UW Medicine. We also got good news from the Center for Dialysis Innovation, which we helped launch in 2017. Its AKTIV portable kidney won a national KidneyX prize as a promising new device concept.



FINANCIAL RESULTS


We invested more than \$38 million in capital projects, compared to \$16 million in FY 2018 and \$9 million in FY 2017. Big-ticket items included building construction, new electronic medical record system, water purification and monitoring equipment, and new dialysis machines.

We provided community benefits totaling \$4.6 million, including support for the Kidney Research Institute, Center for Dialysis Innovation and four fellowships in nephrology at the University of Washington School of Medicine.

Our annual revenue comes from payments for dialysis treatments, earnings on investments, and generous financial donations from people like you.

We initiated a fiscal improvement plan to stabilize costs in light of reimbursement challenges. That helped us end the year with a small margin.




